## PRINTING INSTRUCTIONS / SUGGESTIONS

*I hope you enjoy the Tale of Bunny & Fox as much as I enjoyed creating it. If you would like to print (and possibly frame) the illustration from the story here are some suggestions.*

### PRINTING FROM YOUR HOME PRINTER

Any ink jet or laser printer should do. Ink jet will probably give you the best results. In the Studio, I have an Epson printer (Workforce WF-7820) but by all means a Canon or HP printer should do fine.

For a quality print, use a white sheet that is heavier than your standard 20 lb. paper used for everyday printing. I use either **EPSON Ultra Premium Presentation Paper MATTE** which is heavyweight, 51 lb., 8.5 x 11-inches or an **Office Depot** brand of **Professional Photo Matte Paper**, is heavy-weight, 61 lb., 8.5 x 11-inches. Any comparable paper should work.

Given you would be using a heavier weight paper to print the illustration, you may find yourself using the rear paper feed on you printing if you have that option.

Open your downloaded story PDF file in Adobe Acrobat. Go to Print. Set the page print range for page 2 only so only the illustration will print. If you have the option to set printer settings, choose the type of paper as Photo Matte Paper, set quality to Best.

If printing from home or office is not an option, an Office Depot, FedEx Office or even a UPS store should be able to print a high quality print of the illustration. All you would have to do is copy this PDF file to a thumb drive for them to access and print the illustration for you.

*Given the artwork is done with graphite pencil there won't be any color issues where ever you decide to print your illustration.*

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## FRAMING SUGGESTIONS

*If you are so inclined to frame your illustration (and I hope you do) here are some inexpensive options.*

The Bunny & Fox illustration prints easily on an 8.5 x 11 sheet and will fit comfortably into a standard frame designed to accommodate a 8 x 10 print.

I find Target has quality frames that range from \$15-30 and suggest a light pine frame or a black frame for presenting your illustration. It's super easy to install your print — just pop open the back, position your illustration in the matting, tape it down, and return the backing in place.

[Try the Poster Frame Light Wood - Threshold™](#) The frame size is 16 x 20 so it has a generous mat. (This follows my own aesthetics for framing my artwork, but follow what you love best).

Or try the [Matted PS Narrow Rounded Gallery Frame - Project 62™](#) also found at Target. Note both of the Threshold and Project 62 frame designs are flexible to hang either vertically or horizontally.

A local Michael's store has an abundant selection of frames that can accommodate an 8 x 10 print. Plus they have staff that can assist you.
